

# Should our city preserve its valuable history or just make way for the new?

Dear Editor

Many valuable old buildings have already been demolished to make way for new ones. However, I don't think this is the way forward for our city.

Instead, I believe development can be achieved by heritage revitalization. Take Wing Fung House in Wan Chai as an example. It was built in 1938 by businessman Harrison Fung and has now been renovated by the government to be used as a modern showpiece for old Hong Kong culture. Wing Fung House is characterized by its decorative columns at the front, as well as its French-style windows made of stained glass. In the building, you can also find wooden stairs with handcrafted wooden balustrades and mosaic flooring.

More and more people want to preserve these old historic buildings instead of destroying them. I believe that we have a responsibility to preserve them to give future generations an opportunity to learn the history of the city they are living in through them.
